Guidelines for Project Grants commencing 2023



Overview

Cancer Council NSW is Australia's leading cancer charity, uniting the community, providing support, investing in research and saving lives. Cancer Council is the only cancer charity that works across every area of every cancer:

- funding and conducting world-class research that underpins our work across the cancer journey
- preventing cancer
- supporting people as they navigate the cancer journey
- advocating to ensure governments take action on cancer.

Cancer Council is committed to funding research that enhances outcomes across the entire cancer journey and is of value to the community.

Project Grants

Cancer Council NSW Project Grants (Project Grants) for 2023 are **open to all Australian cancer researchers**. Project Grants will be awarded for up to three years, commencing in 2023.

Project Grants support research in any aspects of cancer, including: its causes, mechanisms, prevention, treatment and care, and the organisation and performance of cancer control services.

At Cancer Council NSW, we believe that the cancer community has a unique insight into the problems faced by those going through a cancer journey. That's why we expect all researchers who apply for our funding to have consumers involved in their research, and it's why we include consumers in the review process.

Grants are valued between \$300,000 and \$450,000 over three years (minimum budget request is \$300,000). The maximum budget which can be requested is normally \$150,000 per annum. The amount requested will be closely scrutinised to ensure that the budget reflects the true cost of undertaking the research proposed. Cancer Council NSW reserves the right to offer a grant a sum that differs substantially from that requested by the applicants.

Applications for Project Grants funding are aligned with the National Health and Medical Research Council's (NHMRC) Ideas Grants submission and review processes. The final decision on funding for Project Grants is with Cancer Council NSW.

This national scheme meets Higher Education Research Data Collection (HERDC) requirements to be reported as Category 1.

Eligibility

- Chief Investigator A (CIA) may hold no more than two concurrent Cancer Council NSW Project Grants.
- At least one named and qualified consumer must be involved in the research proposal. For further guidance, please refer to the Consumer Review Guidelines which can be found on our [website](#).

- Chief Investigators (CIA to CIJ) on any current Cancer Council NSW Program Grant (Program Grant) may not apply or hold a Cancer Council NSW Project Grant during the term of the Program Grant. Any Program Grant Chief Investigators named on a Cancer Council Project Grant application (CIA to CIJ) will make the Project Grant application ineligible.
- Researchers not applying for NHMRC's Ideas Grant funding can still apply for Cancer Council NSW funding.
- Applicants applying for funding from both NHMRC and Cancer Council NSW must adhere to both the NHMRC and Cancer Council NSW eligibility criteria and guidelines. For further information on the NHMRC's Ideas Grants - <https://www.nhmrc.gov.au/funding/find-funding>.
- The list and sequence of all named chief investigators on the Cancer Council NSW application must be the same as that on the NHMRC Idea's Grant application.
- Current funding recipients applying for new funding should note that Cancer Council NSW must have received all due Annual Progress Reports.

Cross Cancer Council scheme eligibility

- Researchers from any Australian state or territory are eligible to apply for Cancer Council NSW Project Grants.
- Researchers based in South Australia and Western Australia are eligible to apply to Cancer Council in their state AND Cancer Council NSW funding.
- Researchers in all other states / territories are eligible to apply for Cancer Council NSW Project funding.
- Researchers ineligible to apply for their State's grant scheme are still eligible to apply for a Cancer Council NSW's Project Grant.
- Applicants applying for funding from both their state's grant scheme and a Cancer Council NSW Project Grant must adhere to the relevant scheme's eligibility criteria and guidelines. If both the state Cancer Council application and Cancer Council NSW Project Grant application are successful, only one of the two offers can be accepted.

Funding Conditions for Project Grants

- Grant funds may not be used:
 - to cover any overhead costs levied by the Administering Institution.
 - fund Associate Investigators' salary or student scholarships. In some circumstances, grant funds can be used to fund a Chief Investigator's salary, however, it is not the intent of Cancer Council NSW to enable salary savings by the Chief Investigator's institution. The administering institution must provide written assurance at time of award that the Chief Investigator requesting salary support will be offered an employment contract exceeding the duration of Project Grant funding. If salary support for a Chief Investigator is sought, Cancer Council NSW reserves the right to request additional justification before agreeing to this funding.
- Cancer Council NSW normally follows NHMRC's Direct Research Costs Guidelines, with the exception of salary requests which are not restricted to NHMRC's pre-defined Personnel Support Package (PSP) levels. Amounts requested for personnel support may cover all salary and salary on-costs (e.g., payroll tax, workers compensation, leave loading, and superannuation).

- Cancer Council awards funding for discrete projects and does not permit grantees to hold duplicate funding for the same purpose from multiple sources. Cancer Council NSW expects grant applicants to accept funding from other funding bodies (such as the NHMRC or Cancer Australia) if offered, allowing other Cancer Council NSW applicants to be funded. Applicants who have been awarded funding from any other source for the same purpose will become ineligible. Chief Investigator A is required to inform Cancer Council NSW immediately should funding from other sources for the same purpose be awarded.
- Cancer Council NSW will not award any grant to any researcher who is:
 - An applicant for, or in receipt of, funds from the tobacco industry or organisations deemed by Cancer Council NSW to be associated with the tobacco industry, regardless of whether the funds are received indirectly, through collaborators, or by other means
 - Employed in a research institute or organisation or, in the case of universities, faculty or school, that allows applications or receives funds from the tobacco industry, whatever the use of those funds may be
 - Employed in a university that accepts funds from the tobacco industry for health-related research or services, wherever in the university that research may be carried out or those services supported.

Cancer Council NSW will terminate its support for a research project, if the above provisions relating to support from the tobacco industry are breached or it believes that the integrity of the research is threatened by influence from tobacco interests.

Submission Process

Applications to the Cancer Council NSW Project Grants comprise:

1. NHMRC Ideas Grant application. To be submitted to the NHMRC in accordance with their guidelines;
2. Submission of responses to the a) Supplementary Questions and b) Consumer Review Questions via the online grant submission form on the Cancer Council NSW [website](#).

NHMRC Ideas Grant application (requirements for Cancer Council funding)

1. Applications submitted via Sapphire must select "**Cancer Council**" as a funding option
2. Applicants must **provide consent** for NHMRC to release application data to partner organisations (that is, Cancer Council).

Supplementary Questions

- Applications must be completed as part of Cancer Council NSW online grant submission form which can be found on the Cancer Council NSW [website](#).
- The Supplementary Questions included in the online grant submission form identify which Cancer Council(s) you are submitting your application to for funding consideration and seeks application information specific to that Cancer Council. Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the Eligibility Criteria and Guidelines of the Cancer Council(s) to which they're applying.
- Applicants must explain how they will modify the aims and objectives of the proposed study to fit within the funding limits of the Cancer Council NSW scheme.

- Information provided in the Supplementary Questions will not be provided to the NHMRC and is for the exclusive use of Cancer Council to assist consideration of funding applications.
- For applicants applying for the Cancer Council NSW Project Grants category, select the Cancer Council NSW check box under the question “Which Cancer Council/s are you applying to?”
- Applications received after the closing date will not be accepted.
- The Supplementary Questions for Cancer Council NSW Project Grants as follows:
 - NHMRC Application ID
 - Which Cancer Council/s are you applying to?
 - Chief Investigator A contact details
 - Lay title and summary of your project (150 word limit)
 - Research team – list of all Chief Investigators and Associate Investigators
 - Administering Institution details
 - Cancer type
 - Relevance to the causes, diagnosis, treatment or prevention of cancer (2500 character limit)
 - Is your application being considered for funding by the NHMRC and/or Cancer Australia?
 - NSW Scope of research and budget
 - Budget
 - What modifications to your project will be required in order for it to fit with the level of funding being offered by Cancer Council NSW (2500 character limit)
 - Project timeline (2500 character limit) Budget
 - Justification for salary requests (2500 character limit)
 - Explanatory details about changes to budget from NHMRC application (2500 character limit)
 - Ethics and other approvals required
 - Data collection- age group, research area, cancer population, common scientific outline
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Consumer Review Questions

- The Consumer Review responses require applicants to illustrate how the proposed research project will address the five criteria: 1) Magnitude of problem and extent of benefit; 2) pathway for realising the benefit, 3) potential for application of findings, 4) equity, and 5) consumer involvement. **Refer to the** Consumer Review Guidelines which can be found on the Cancer Council NSW [website](#) for further guidance.
- Cancer Council NSW’s Consumer Review Panel will be provided with *only* the responses to the Consumer Review questions, and the Cancer Council NSW Project Grant lay summary provided as part of the Cancer Council NSW online grant submission form. Ensure the Consumer Review responses can be read as stand-alone information, without reference to the NHMRC application and Supplementary Questions responses. The Consumer Review questions should be completed via the Consumer Review Form. Applicants will be prompted to upload the Consumer Review Form as part of the online submission form. The Consumer Review Form can be downloaded from the Cancer Council NSW [website](#).
- The Consumer Review Form must be completed adhering to the formatting requirements and page limits set out in the Consumer Review Guidelines for Project Grants.

- Applicants are to upload a single WORD file - name [App ID]_ConsumerForm_CIA Family Name, e.g., '9123456_ConsumerForm_Smith' when prompted as part of the Cancer Council NSW online grant submission form.
- Scanned documents will not be accepted.
- Applications received after the closing date will not be accepted.

Application and Assessment Process

Our research funding comes from donations from the general public. Consequently, funding research that is both of significant scientific merit and of value to the community we serve and represent helps to ensure Cancer Council NSW responds to the genuine requirements of the community that supports us.

Review of applications occurs in two stages. Applications are initially reviewed through the NHMRC Ideas Grant peer review process. Those applicants assessed as fundable by the NHMRC are then reviewed for potential benefit and community engagement by Cancer Council NSW's Consumer Review Panel.

For each application, applicants must complete a Consumer Review Form. Applicant responses to these criteria subsequently will be scored against the consumer review criteria by a panel of trained research consumers (the Consumer Review Panel) convened by Cancer Council NSW. To determine the final ranking of applications, **equal weighting** is given to the NHMRC scientific review score and the consumer review score, that is, the Consumer Review Panel score comprises **50% of the final score** assigned during the assessment process.

Consumers are not provided with either the full NHMRC scientific application or NHMRC ranking during the review process. The Panel scores applications based solely on the applicants' responses to the Consumer Review questions provided as part of the Cancer Council NSW online grant submission form.

Applicants are normally notified of outcomes in December each year.

The decision of the Board is final. Any complaints about administrative process must be made in writing, signed by the complainant, and addressed to the Chair, Cancer Research Committee, specifying the nature of and grounds for the complaint.

Grant Administration

Funding Agreement

Upon acceptance of the offer, a Funding Agreement will be prepared and issued to the Administering Institution. The Administering Institution and Chief Investigator A must accept the terms of the Funding Agreement and sign the Agreement before payments are made. It is recommended all parties familiarise themselves with the Funding Agreement prior to submission. The Funding Agreement is available to review on our [website](#).

Duplicate Funding

Cancer Council awards funding for discrete projects and does not permit grantees to hold duplicate funding for the same purpose from multiple sources. Applicants who have been awarded funding from other sources for the same purpose will become ineligible. Chief Investigator A is required to inform Cancer Council NSW immediately should funding from other sources for the same activities be awarded.

Terms of Funding

Regardless of the budget details for the grant requested, and the basis on which the funding offered was determined, the grant will be offered as a “one line” grant without specification of distribution between salaries, maintenance and equipment - but note Cancer Council NSW normally only allows expenditure in accordance with NHMRC Direct Research Costs Guidelines.

The grant must be spent wholly for the purposes for which it was requested and so certified by the Chief Investigator A and the Administering Institution. In the event that the research is terminated early or completed at a lower than initially envisaged cost, Cancer Council NSW must be advised and any unspent funds returned.

Payments in respect of any grant shall be within the terms and conditions specified in the funding offer and set out in the Funding Agreement.

Administering Institution requirements

There will be only one Administering Institution for each grant.

The Administering Institution guarantees the infrastructure necessary to support the research will be available. Its explicit support for and commitment to the application is essential before any application can be considered.

The Administering Institution will be held responsible for the proper administration and expenditure of the grant and for ensuring that all reports required are submitted by the due date.

Personnel

Grant-supported personnel will be employees of the Institution(s) in which the research is conducted and will be subject to the conditions of employment of those Institutions. Cancer Council NSW will make no contribution to the costs of their employment outside the grant offered.
