Meet Monica

Monica* was just 45-years-old when she was diagnosed with breast cancer.

Monica migrated to Australia from Ethiopia, she is a mother of teenage twins and lives with her husband who is a casual worker.

Monica previously worked part-time but has been unable to work due to side effects of her treatment, impacting the family's finances and ability to pay the mortgage on their home.

Monica's Occupational Therapist referred her to one of our Cancer Council Liaisons, Kate*. When Kate and Monica first spoke, they discussed the impacts of Moncia's cancer diagnosis – the emotional and the practical – and Kate was able to assess her current psychosocial and practical needs. Kate provided emotional support to Monica, as she spoke about the side effects of her treatment and all the ways they impact her life.



It was clear that Monica was under financial stress and Kate was able to organise some immediate relief in the form of food vouchers. They also discussed Cancer Council financial counselling services, empowering Monica to navigate the options available to her, such as advocating with her bank to reduce or place her mortgage repayments on hold. Monica felt supported to work with the bank by herself and was able to have their mortgage payments reduced for several months.

As her diagnosis progressed, Monica began experiencing cording and lymphoedema which meant she required some more practical support. She reached out to Kate again who organised Cancer Council Home Help for her.

Over time, Kate and Monica discussed what returning to work might look like. Monica was referred to the Cancer Council Pro Bono Program to assist in preparation for looking for a new job, as she was unable to return to her previous work due to side effects of her treatment, and was successful in securing a new casual position in a different profession.

When her treatment was finally complete, Monica contacted Kate to thank her for all the support that she and Cancer Council NSW provided to her and her family.

Every day, there are people all across NSW who face similar struggles to Monica and who go without this vital practical and emotional support when they need it most.

What you have made possible this year in cancer research.

Before we invest in any new research project, it is reviewed by both scientific experts and our panel of cancer survivors and carers. This allows us to make sure we fund research that is of most benefit to the cancer community while maintaining the highest scientific standards.



Thanks to your support, this year we've been able to award more than \$18.2 million in funding to 58 world-class cancer research projects.

These eminent and emerging cancer researchers are investigating new treatments and solutions to common treatment challenges. The projects span a range of cancers, including common cancers like breast and prostate, and rarer cancers such as childhood cancer

Overcoming a major treatment challenge in advanced prostate cancer \$450,000 awarded to Professor Jeff Holst and his team who aim to develop a new drug treatment strategy to overcome resistance to hormone therapy in prostate cancer. If Professor Holst's project is successful, the team will be well-placed to start clinical trials of a new treatment with the potential to prevent deaths from advanced-stage prostate cancer that has stopped responding to hormone therapy.

Targeting childhood cancer where it begins \$448,552 awarded to Professor Murray Norris. Through their investigations, Professor Norris and his team hope to develop a new way to treat childhood cancers. The team has a long history of working closely with clinicians, in Australia and overseas, to translate their lab discoveries into real-world improvements for patients. If this research is successful, the team hopes to move quickly towards a clinical trial for a new, more effective and less toxic treatment for aggressive childhood cancers.

Developing an immunotherapy for triple negative breast cancer \$407,328 awarded to Associate Professor David Gallego Ortega for work that could pave the way for a new generation of immune therapies for triple negative breast cancer. This research project will develop biomarkers for myeloid-derived suppressor cells (MDSCs) to detect the early spread of triple negative breast cancer cells to other parts of the body and refine a treatment prototype that targets only MDSCs, leaving immune cells unharmed.

What have we been advocating for this year?

Earlier this year, we called on the NSW Government to protect life's moments and commit to be Here for Change through our four election priorities:

- 1 Invest in cancer prevention so more people can live a cancer free life
- Improve early detection and diagnosis of bowel cancer so more lives can be saved
- Introduce the highest standards of cancer care so people with cancer receive the best possible care, no matter who they are or where they live
- Support people to live well during and after a cancer diagnosis so they can live a higher quality of life

Real change takes all of us. In the lead-up to the NSW state election, almost 5,000 people signed our online petition, we had 120 meetings with Ministers, Shadow Ministers, Members of Parliament (MPs) and candidates to discuss our Here for Change priorities, with 20 MPs publicly supporting our key priorities.

Following the election, we have written to and met with key Ministers who have expressed support for Cancer Council NSW advocacy priorities and have urged us to continue advocating with all MPs across NSW.

86% of primary schools participated in our SunSmart Program, helping protect students from over-exposure to UV radiation

4,941 community members signed our petition to remove unhealthy food marketing from NSW government property, including buses and trains

9,075 inquiries were fielded by our 13 11 20 team to help people affected by cancer and health professionals



How has financial assistance helped empower people to focus on getting through treatment and living well?

For people like Allie, Cancer Council's Client Services team is more than just a vital source of practical support. After being diagnosed with an aggressive cancer in early 2021, and facing financial struggles due to having to turn down her dream job and lack of available rental properties during the COVID pandemic, Allie was forced to sell her car and move interstate to live with family.

On top of her cancer diagnosis, this chain of events left her devastated and demoralised.

A year after diagnosis, Allie had undergone eleven different scans, five flights to the city, three surgeries, various treatments and the costs to 'keep me alive' continued to mount. A friendly neighbour, Judy, dropped by to visit and suggested Allie call Cancer Council as she knew about our financial assistance program.

Allie recalls her conversations with our Client Services team,

They were kind, compassionate and spoke without judgement. They arranged financial assistance for my hotel, groceries and counselling costs. It overwhelmed me with gratitude. Far greater than financial support, Cancer Council showed me a resounding space of support and compassion.

In my experience as a rural patient, without Cancer Council, my ability to access services would have been slower due to my financial constraints. I may not have gotten medical care as quickly as I did and may not have been able to share my story today.

14,016 nights of affordable accommodation were provided to cancer patients and carers, close to treatment centres

We facilitated **\$3.1m of free legal**, financial planning and workplace advice to 1,384 patients and carers through our Pro Bono Program

19,847 trips were made by our Transport to Treatment drivers, so cancer patients and carers could get to treatment

The year ahead.

Over the next 12 months we'll be getting to work on our new five-year vision.

Why?

- In NSW alone, there are more than 50,000 new cancer cases each year, and 15,000 cancer-related deaths.
- Thanks to advances in cancer research, prevention, early detection and treatment, more people than ever are surviving, with 71% of people diagnosed with cancer in NSW surviving for 5 years or more.
- Over the next 25 years, around 1.52 million people in NSW will be diagnosed with cancer. This means there are more cancer survivors and people living with and beyond cancer in our community who need Cancer Council's ongoing support.

How? '

- We will grow our impact in areas of greatest need: We will ensure everything we do has a positive effect on cancer outcomes, in particular in the communities with the greatest need. We'll also use our resources wisely, to prioritise the projects with the most opportunity to drive change.
- We will improve the lives of cancer survivors: We will use our research findings
 to improve the lives of cancer survivors and people living with the ongoing
 impact of cancer in NSW, and use our voice to advocate for change in areas of
 unmet need.
- We will work with community for better outcomes: We will form partnerships
 with like-minded organisations, combining our expertise to increase support for
 people with cancer and save lives. By working with the NSW community, we will
 prioritise our focus to make sure we are driving change where it is needed most.

Outcomes:

- Reduced cancer risk
- Improved cancer survival among people who are diagnosed with cancer in NSW
- Enhanced quality of life for people impacted by cancer in NSW
- Improved equity in cancer outcomes in NSW
