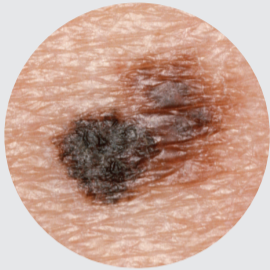


What does skin cancer look like?

Two out of three Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer in their lifetime. It's important to regularly check for new or changing spots.

! DANGER SIGNS



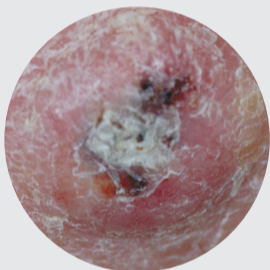
Melanoma

- uneven colour
- irregular shape
- irregular border



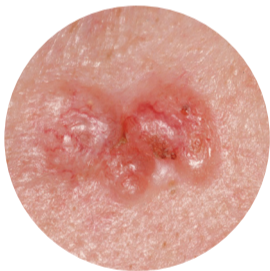
Nodular Melanoma

- black, brown, pink or red
- round, raised, firm lump
- may crust or bleed



Squamous Cell Carcinoma (SCC)

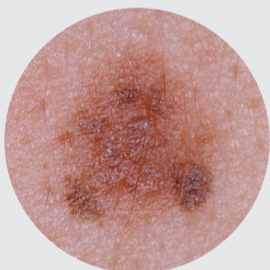
- red, pink or scaly
- thick, scaly or crusted
- may ulcerate or bleed



Basal Cell Carcinoma (BCC)

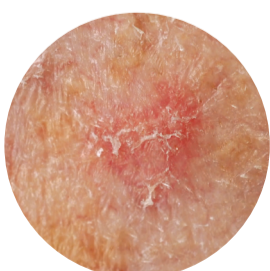
- red, pink, purple or pearly
- flat, raised or scaly area
- may ulcerate, bleed or weep

! WARNING SIGNS



Dysplastic Naevi

- brown or pink uneven colour
- irregular shape
- often a larger mole



Solar Keratosis or Sunspot

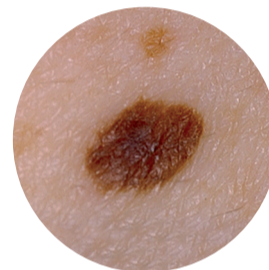
- uneven red or skin colour
- flat with irregular outline
- dry scaly or rough

HARMLESS SPOTS



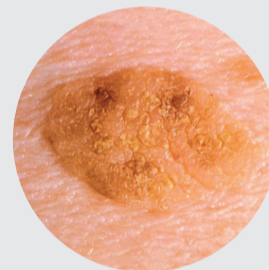
Freckle

- single-coloured spots
- small and flat



Mole

- black, brown or skin colour
- oval or round
- flat or slightly raised



Seborrhoeic Keratosis

- skin tone to brown or black
- may look or feel like a wart
- a raised or rough area

* Your skin spots may differ from those shown

When the UV is 3 or above, protect your skin in 5 ways.

Slap

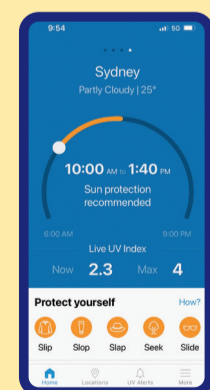
